COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND POLICIES:

Attendance and Participation: Students are expected to attend and participate in lectures and sections. Please arrive punctually and, except in cases of emergency, do not leave the room until the session has concluded; please also make sure to turn off all cell phones and pagers. Discussion will be an especially integral part of each section meeting, and you will be expected to complete the section assignments and come prepared to discuss readings. More than three unexcused absences from lectures or section meetings could lower your final grade.

Writing Assignments:

There will be three papers assigned for this class: a midterm paper (4-5 pages), a final paper (6-8 pages), and a brief response paper based on the play *Prometheus Bound* (see "Play Attendance and Paper" below). Preceptors may also assign informal writing assignments in conjunction with section meetings.

<u>Paper Submission</u>: Individual preceptors will determine whether papers are to be submitted electronically or in hardcopy. Papers should be double-spaced with one-inch margins; pages should be numbered and, if submitted in hardcopy, stapled. A separate title page is not necessary, but the first page should include your name, your preceptor's name, the date, and the title of the essay.

<u>Due Dates and Late Papers:</u> Papers must be submitted by the deadline. Late papers will be penalized one-third of a grade per day (a B+ becomes a B, etc.).

<u>Use and Citation of Sources:</u> Papers require that students formulate their own ideas in response to readings, lectures, and discussions; therefore, you should not consult outside scholarly texts when writing them. It may be necessary at times to refer to ideas from printed/electronic sources or from class discussion. Please take care to credit ideas that are not your own; if you are not sure whether a citation is required, please consult me or your preceptor. Unauthorized collaboration with other students and the submission of work you previously submitted for another class are unacceptable. *Plagiarism or academic dishonesty of any kind will result in failure*.

Exams

There will be a midterm before spring break and a final exam during exam period. Review guidelines will be distributed as the exams approach.

Play Attendance and Paper

Students will be required to attend a performance of *Prometheus Bound* at the Classic Stage Company (136 E. 13th Street). A short writing assignment based on

the performance will be due in April. I will arrange for a discounted group rate, and students can purchase their own tickets.
